We stayed and explored Barcelona, Valencia, Alicante, Granada, Ronda, Seville, Cordoba, Toledo, Avila and finally, Madrid. The goal was to see all of the historical parts of Spain during this trip which took us to Gaudi's Sagrada Familia, Alhambra, we saw flamenco dancing, visited the Royal Palace and the Prado in Madrid and much more. Driving from city to city was made stress-free by six lane divided highways but navigating the historic parts of the cities by car proved to very difficult. On more than one occasion, we enlisted the help of a local person on a scooter, motorcycle or on foot to help us find the hotel. The trip would have been more enjoyable had we taken the train from city to city, then a taxi to the hotel from the train station. The train system is excellent in Spain and it's the only way to explore the historical parts of the country. # Marilyn's Back Surgery

One of the biggest problems with leading a tour in Ecuador was the condition of the roads. They always seemed to be under construction, washed out or covered with lava flow from an erupting volcano, which caused many delays. Last year, we were delighted to see that they had made a concerted effort to improve all of the roads which made life for us very much easier.
